# INTRODUCTION



## Executive Summary

This Annual Report demonstrates that the Town of Holly Springs remains a safe and friendly community. The overall crime rate is one of the lowest by almost all measures for a rapidly developing city of this size. Last year, the police department reported property crime rates five times lower than the state and national averages, and violent crime levels 13 times lower than the state average and 12 times lower than the national average. During this reporting period, the Town's more than 50,000 residents have experienced similarly low rates. However, because the federal government's reporting index changed from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) to National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) model, statistics are no longer available to make similar state and national comparisons. But it is important to reiterate that the overall crime index for the Town has remained relatively unchanged and comparatively low, even as the population increases.

Notable figures captured in this report include an increase in aggravated assaults from 3 to 24 events. Most of these assaults require mandatory reporting including domestic violence and school-based incidents. Domestic violence accounts for almost 60% of these reports and two, school-based incidents make up another 8% of these cases. Burglaries also rose 20% from 30 to 36. These included breaking & entering of businesses, and houses that were under construction where building materials were taken. Another subset of incidents included juveniles entering schools and neighborhood pool club houses after hours.

Conversely, the Town experienced a 50% reduction in robberies from four to two cases, and motor vehicle thefts decreased by 27% from eleven to eight incidents. This is on top of a 30% reduction last year. Vandalisms, which are overwhelming comprised of graffiti incidents, also dropped, 21% from 84 to 66 events.

A consequence of the continued growth the region is experiencing is a large increase in the number of vehicles on the Town's roadways. Even with heavier traffic, the total number of traffic collisions declined slightly. However, there was an increase in crashes involving injury. Additionally, there was only one fatal collision, sadly between a deer and motorcyclist. This represents a decrease of an average of two fatalities annually for the first time in several years.

While every community experiences fluctuations in various rates of crime from year to year, the Town's overall crime rate remains significantly low. The police department is committed to providing the highest level of service to the community and preserving the high quality of life residents and businesses enjoy in Holly Springs.



# MESSAGE *from the Chief*

During this annual reporting period, the men and women of the Holly Springs Police Department have continued to provide an outstanding level of service, regardless of the challenges inherent to the law enforcement profession. The dedication, labor, and bravery they display in accomplishing the difficult work they perform is only matched by their altruism, generosity and commitment they provide our community. These attributes are exhibited 365 days a year in order to maintain Holly Springs as one of the safest and most welcoming cities in North Carolina.

The officers, telecommunicators, and professional staff of the police department are as dedicated to community service and engagement, as they are to resolving citizens' concerns and performing their law enforcement duties. We are grateful to have the exceptional support of our residents, business owners, elected officials and Town leadership as we reflect on our performance and accomplishments as we continue to move forward.

The department's Police-Community Advisory Group (PCAG) has been active for almost two years now, providing a platform to improve dialogue and understanding between the Town's officers and its citizens providing representation from various neighborhoods throughout our community. The University of North Carolina - School of Government (UNC-SOG) has recognized the Town's PCAG by including the group on the schools website and publications as a model for advisory groups. The first terms of the group's membership are closing, allowing for new residents to participate in their municipal government in this unique way. The Citizen Police Academy completed its third, multi-week session adding to the alumni who have taken the opportunity to learn more about the laws, policies, and organization that govern how their police department operates. Another Academy session will be offered in early 2024 and is open to all residents of Holly Springs.

Over the last year, the Town's Emergency Communications Center (9-1-1 dispatch hub) has undergone a major upgrade, installing advanced technology to ensure calls for service are received efficiently and then rapidly dispatched to the emergency medical services, fire and/or police departments. The recent renovations have also increased the center's capacity to accommodate more telecommunicators to address the future needs of the Town's expansive residential development and growing number of businesses.

After the elementary school shooting in Uvalde, Texas, HSPD conducted a gaps assessment based on the after-action report from that incident and identified needed training and equipment improvements. As a result, the Town Council allotted funding for each officer to be equipped with enhanced ballistic protection and other equipment to allow line officers to more immediately, accurately and confidently address similar critical situations. HSPD has also joined a collaborative, multi-agency, regional tactical team; greatly enhancing the department's ability to respond to large-scale incidents and improving overall training.



## FBI NATIONAL ACADEMY - CAPTAIN MIKE PATTERSON

The awards they have received this year are a testament to their hard work, dedication, and the significant difference they make in our community. These include the Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) 1st and 2nd DRE HERO Awards and the Platinum Elite Awards from the State of North Carolina Drug Recognition Program. In addition, Sgt. Laws was awarded the State's Drug Evaluation and Classification Program's Cardinal Award and Officer Chirino was recognized as the "DRE of the Year".


The Holly Springs Police Department extends its heartfelt congratulations to these outstanding officers and looks forward to their continued contributions to our community's safety and well-being.

## POPULATION GROWTH & CALLS FOR SERVICE *five year trend*




*Calls for service continue to increase at a lower rate than the Town's population. This is just one indicator that Holly Springs is a "Safe and Friendly" community.*

## UNIFORM CRIME REPORT PART I *property crime five year trend*




*This year, motor vehicle theft dropped. While there was a slight increase in burglaries and larcenies, these are mainly attributed to commercial and retail establishments.*

*Robberies decreased by half from the previous year. In all of the rape cases, the suspect was known to the victim. A significant majority of aggravated assaults were domestic violence related.*



## TOWN RESIDENCY STATUS *of arrestees*








### *demographics and totals*




### *enforcement actions*

*Traffic collisions are down by more than 10% on top of a 38% reduction from last year.*






# USE OF FORCE

The Holly Springs Police Department's Use of Force policy requires that any force other than voluntary compliance with a physical arrest (beyond simply handcuffing a suspect) requires a formal Use of Force Report to be completed and submitted for review.

Additionally, the intentional pointing of a firearm or a conducted energy weapon (CEW - TASER) at a person also requires a report.
