## Explore Holly Springs Historical Markers with New Online Tour

With National Historic Preservation Month this May, the Town is launching an online tour of all the historical markers around Town, including the newest marker planned to be unveiled in the coming weeks at First Baptist Church of Holly Springs on Grigsby Ave.

The church dates to 1865 when a group of about 50 freedmen pooled their resources and purchased a half-acre plot of land. Services were held in a log cabin until the church building was constructed. The original church structure burned, and all documents were lost. The present structure was built in 1880. Brick facing and memorial windows were added in the early 1950s.

The online tour shares details and historical images that tell the stories behind all historical markers in Holly Springs, including Woodward's Mill, operated by a Revolutionary War patriot; Holly Springs Masonic Lodge 115, one of the oldest lodges and school buildings in the county; Holly Springs Elementary School, a public school for Black children; and many others.

The online tour began as a project by Bridget Peters, an intern with Holly Springs Development Services, working with Town Planner Conor Ryan.

As more historical markers are added around Holly Springs, the online map will be updated.

Following the unveiling of the First Baptist Church marker, the Town plans to install a marker for the Cape Fear & Northern Railroad/Durham & Southern Railroad. Constructed in the 1890s, the railroad connected to Apex and

Angier. The last train ran through Holly Springs in 1981, and the tracks were later removed.

## Eagles Landing Park Construction Begins

Construction fencing parallels Cass Holt Road and wraps around Eagles Landing Park land – a sign that construction is beginning on the first park west of N.C. 55.

The 56 acres across from Holly Springs High School are being transformed into a multi-generational indoor recreation center, outdoor splash pad, lighted pickleball courts, basketball courts, turf fields, and more, thanks to voter-approved bonds.

Town leaders plan to gather in early May for an official groundbreaking ceremony. Visitors should not enter the property during construction. The park's opening is anticipated in 2027, though certain park amenities could potentially open earlier.

Work is slated to begin this summer on other projects, including new baseball dugouts at Womble Park, and seating at the Cultural Center.

## New Bass Lake Spillway to Reduce Flooding

Planning to visit Bass Lake Park? You may notice some construction activity near the parking lot. A new, additional spillway is being built to help mitigate flooding at the park and downstream during heavy rain events. The new spillway will enhance drainage capacity, reducing the risk of water overtopping the dam and preventing potential damage to the parking lot.

During construction, some of the parking spaces adjacent to the lake are closed. The park remains open; construction is anticipated to wrap up this summer.

# Town Offers On-Demand Yard Waste Cart Pickup

A few times per year you may have a need to dispose of yard waste when it's not your scheduled collection day. In addition to the option of using the Town's convenience center, the Town Council approved on-demand yard waste cart pickups for \$15 per extra collection. While the standard bi-weekly yard waste cart collection continues throughout the year, any resident who wants to schedule an extra yard waste cart pickup can call 311 or use the app to arrange for collection on the following business day.

"The Town anticipates that optional extra cart collections will be convenient for some Holly Springs residents, especially those with larger yards who don't want to wait until their scheduled yard waste collection day," said Solid Waste Division Manager Freddie Rodriguez with Holly Springs Public Works. "Scheduling an on-demand yard waste cart pickup is easy, and the charge for the extra collection will simply be added to the resident's next utility bill."

The new option is in addition to the regularly scheduled bi-weekly yard waste cart collection, which residents will continue to receive. Additionally, the Town's vacuum trucks will continue to collect leaves that don't fit into carts during the fall and winter months at no added charge.

The Yard Waste Convenience Center off Rex Road is another option for residents who have excessive yard waste and want to dispose of it for no additional charge, Rodriguez noted.

Bring proof of Holly Springs residence, such as a driver's license or utility bill.



# Town Council Considers Possible Sports & Entertainment District for Ting Park

Imagine a future when family outings to ballgames at Ting Park could seamlessly transition into an evening of dining and entertainment just steps away. Imagine inviting grandparents to Holly Springs to cheer on your child in a sports tournament and, between games, enjoying some light shopping and a quick restaurant lunch – all without jumping in a vehicle.


The Holly Springs Town Council is exploring conceptual possibilities of establishing a Sports & Entertainment District around Ting Park. The district could transform about 2.5 acres of largely undeveloped Town-owned land in and around Ting Park into a vibrant destination that extends its appeal beyond sporting events.

"Creating a Sports & Entertainment District at Ting Park is an exciting concept," said Sean Ryan, Planning Manager with Holly Springs Development Services. "It's also something that resident feedback supported during the development of the Town's most recent Comprehensive Plan."

The development would occur through a public-private partnership, like the recent downtown partnership that resulted in the construction of retail and office buildings and the Town's parking deck. It is anticipated that most of the investment would come from private developers, not from the Town, enabling the Town to capitalize on its existing investment in the park itself.

Ryan noted that the district could build upon Ting Park's already significant draw; the park attracted 750,000 visitors in 2023 alone. During his presentation to the Council, Ryan shared a few different conceptual ideas for the district. The concepts explored the development of retail spaces in multi-story buildings that could also house multi-family residences, a 'festival street' designed to host pedestrian-friendly events, diverse entertainment options, and more.

Areas under consideration include an open field adjacent to the stadium and near the tennis courts, as well as areas surrounding the stadium.



"All of the options are conceptual at this point," Ryan said. "We are currently developing an understanding of what resources we may have and what the possibilities could be."

The Town plans additional public engagement as concepts continue to be developed and a request for proposals is crafted for consideration.
