This month, Rex Road Elementary is opening its doors to students. The new school follows a year-round calendar, so drivers along Rex Road near its intersection with Buckhorn Duncan Road should be watchful as students and parents adjust to new school year routines and commutes. Holly Springs is thrilled to be adding a school resource officer covering Rex Road Elementary as part of our commitment to enhancing safety in schools within Town limits.

In August, Felton Grove High School, located off Stephenson Road in Apex, opens for a student base that includes many areas in Holly Springs. The school is 400,588 square feet with a capacity of 2,223 students.

Holly Springs Road Roundabout Construction Begins

School's out for summer – at least for traditional calendar schools – and just in time: Construction is gearing up to build a roundabout on Holly Springs Road near Holly Ridge Elementary and Middle schools.

The roundabout is part of the project to widen Holly Springs Road to four lanes. It will be located at the Holly Springs Road intersection with Cobblepoint Way and the entrance to Holly Ridge Elementary.

"This roundabout will help ease congestion, allowing traffic to flow at the fullest capacity at this intersection, while making this busy area safer for both drivers and pedestrians," said Kendra Parrish, Executive Director of Holly Springs Utilities & Infrastructure. "The roundabout was the only way to continue to provide full access to the school and subdivision. Without a roundabout, NCDOT would have required a median, preventing any left turn movements at the intersection."

In the coming weeks, drivers will notice construction crews completing median work. When the work reaches the roundabout area, cones will be used to direct traffic into a single-lane roundabout pattern. Drivers should yield to vehicles already in the roundabout.

Once the median work is completed, the roundabout will be converted to two-lanes for drivers on Holly Springs Road. View a video about how drivers will navigate the roundabout at hollyspringsnc.gov/hsroad.

Roundabout construction and painting of nearby crosswalks is planned to wrap up before school begins in late August. Installation of flashing beacons for pedestrians at the crosswalks is set for the coming months.

Completion of widening Holly Springs Road from Flint Point Lane (at Fire Station 1) to Sunset Lake Road is



anticipated by the end of the calendar year. Then the construction focus will shift down the road to the next phase of widening, Main Street to Flint Point Lane.

Main Street and N.C. 55 Turn Lane Updates

Work also is continuing on bond-funded turn lane projects along Main Street at Holly Springs Road and along N.C. 55, from Avent Ferry Road to Main Street.

While work along 55 is anticipated to have minimal impact to traffic this month, drivers along Main Street should expect lane closures with traffic shifts between 9 a.m.-4 p.m.

Operation Freeze Rewards Safe Bicyclists

As temperatures heat up, the Holly Springs Police have the ticket to staying cool as Operation Freeze returns for the summer. As part of the initiative, the Police are patrolling neighborhoods beginning this month. When they see a young bicyclist who is riding safely, the Police may deliver a coupon for a free sweet treat at a local restaurant.

"Operation Freeze is a fantastic way to encourage children to wear helmets, stop at crosswalks, and obey traffic signals and signs," said Officer Leon Nelson, who is heading up this year's program.

Nelson asks parents to talk with their children about bike safety:

- Wear a properly fitted helmet and clothing that is easily visible when riding near sunset or at night.
- Follow the same rules as motorists. Bicyclists should stop at all stop signs, just as vehicles do. This helps

prevent accidents and maintains smooth traffic flow

- Yield the right of way to pedestrians at crosswalks, and be extra careful at intersections.

Town Updating Plan that Guides Future Investments

This year, Holly Springs is updating three sections of its Comprehensive Plan, the primary tool used by Town staff, the Planning Board, and the Town Council to determine priorities for public investments.

Sections being updated this year include those about:

- Community Facilities (such as land designated for police or fire stations and schools)
- Infrastructure & Utilities
- Natural Areas

Updates help ensure that all sections of the plan are aligned so the Town can adequately plan for future growth and development.

Holly Springs to Resurface Nearly 5 Miles of Streets

Every year, the Town of Holly Springs identifies streets to be resurfaced as part of an ongoing effort to keep roadways in good shape as the Town grows. This year, the Town is resurfacing nearly 5 miles of asphalt along 21 streets in Holly Springs.

The project, which could begin in July, is anticipated to wrap up in November. Nearby residents



will be notified by the contractor in advance. Be aware of workers, equipment, and trucks in the street and please drive slowly and carefully.

This year's \$2,495,853 project is funded by the State through Powell Bill funding from gasoline tax revenues.

How are streets selected for resurfacing and preservation?

About every five years, a street rating survey is performed on the entire town-maintained road network. The information is then combined with other factors like traffic volume, safety, and interconnectivity to create a ranking priority for roads that are selected for repair.

Budget Focuses on Strategic Council Initiatives

The Holly Springs Town Council has adopted the Town's upcoming fiscal year budget. The \$117 million budget includes investments in managing traffic, transforming downtown Holly Springs, expanding walkability and mobility options, and constructing voter-approved Park Bond projects.

The budget has no change to the property tax rate of 34.35 cents per \$100 valuation, which maintains Holly Springs as one of the lowest property tax rates in Wake County.

Water and sewer rate fees increase, resulting in the average user paying an additional \$12.98 per month to secure future water and wastewater supply. Garbage and recycling fees increase by .59 cents per month. There are no changes in yard waste fees or stormwater fees.

Parking Lot Behind Town Hall to Temporarily Close

Downtown visitors may notice construction activity through mid-August as an HVAC unit at Town Hall is replaced.

Holly Springs Town Hall will remain open during the work. Because the building is served by multiple HVAC systems, services and scheduled meetings will continue uninterrupted. During construction, access to Town Hall will be available through the front entrance on Main Street only. Accessible parking will be provided in the Mims Square Parking Lot along the Main Street side.

The small parking lot immediately behind Town Hall is expected to close for a few days in late July through early August. The space is being used for construction staging, and a crane will be used to remove and replace the HVAC unit in the attic. The larger parking lot beside Town Hall, adjacent to Mims Towne Square, will remain open, although access to the parking lot may be available from Avent Ferry Road only at certain times during

June as preliminary work begins.

Finance: While transactions can be completed online, customers wishing to pay utility bills in person can visit the Finance office. Additionally, check payments can be deposited in the silver drop box in the side parking lot next to Town Hall. Place your check payment with your bill in a sealed envelope.



Permitting and development services are offered through the Town's online portal. Both residents and businesses can apply for permits virtually. Holly Springs Development Services staff will also be available at Town Hall to help those who wish to receive in-person assistance. Development inspections will continue as planned.

Town Replacing Turf on Ting Fields

The Town is replacing the synthetic turf on the Ting Park multipurpose fields this month. The fields will be lined for various ages to play both soccer and lacrosse.

During construction, anticipated to wrap up by the end of the month, Womble Park fields will be available for summer programs and open play.

New Accessible & Inclusive Recreation Program Offers Opportunities for All

Music therapy, workplace and social skill development, bingo, sword fighting, and more: What do all these events have in common? They're part of new Accessible and Inclusive Recreation programming offered through Holly Springs Parks & Recreation. And, best of all, everyone is invited!

The new Accessible and Inclusive Recreation (AIR) Program provides ways for people with and without disabilities to enjoy activities in a safe and accepting environment. Activities range from recreation and social activities, such as yoga for youth with and without physical or cognitive disabilities, to classes for families navigating a new disability, to coaching to help participants navigate social situations and build meaningful connections.

"We are incredibly excited to offer accessible and inclusive recreation programming designed to help participants have fun and develop skills that will make a real difference in their lives," said Robert Sears, the Town's program specialist who is spearheading the initiative.



AIR Program Instructors are trained and experienced in working with individuals with physical and intellectual disabilities. Caregivers are welcome and do not require separate registration.

In addition to activities, the program is providing sensory bags with tactile

and visual items designed to help regulate emotions and reduce anxiety at numerous Town facilities.

Sensory bags offer a variety of items, including headphones and sunglasses, activity cards, fidget and squishy objects, and more. Communications aids, developed in partnership with A Voice for All Foundation, also are included in the bags.

"The bags and items inside can offer discreet and effective tools for self-soothing," Sears said. "The items can help both children and adults better participate in environments they might find overwhelming."

Sensory bags are free to borrow and available in the Holly Springs Town Hall Council Chambers, at the front desks of the Hunt Center, Bass Lake, and Cultural Center, and at Ting Stadium.

Visitors are welcome to borrow the entire bag or just an item or two during the activity or meeting. Items are cleaned between use and should be returned after guests are done using them.

"Our culture in Holly Springs is one of inclusion," Sears said. "We hope the sensory items bring comfort, focus, and calm vibes to visitors of all ages at Town programs and events."

The AIR program also is working to install additional communication boards inside popular Town facilities. The visual boards help people who have difficulty with verbal communication express themselves. Similar to the large boards at the Womble, Jones, and Veterans Park playgrounds, communication boards are being added to two program rooms at the Hunt Center in collaboration with A Voice for All Foundation.

Additionally, Town of Holly Springs is able to provide American Sign Language and language interpretation services, both for meetings at Holly Springs Town Hall and when interacting with the Town for services and information. For Town Council meetings, please contact the Town Clerk's office at least 48 hours in advance to ensure this service will be available.
